



**About PAGE** In March 2015, South Africa joined the global programme, Partnership for Action on Green Economy (PAGE), a United Nations (UN) programme which brings together the expertise of five UN agencies: United Nations Environment Programme (UN Environment), International Labour Organization (ILO), United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), United Nations Industrial Development Organization (UNIDO) and United Nations Institute for Training and Research (UNITAR) to support nations and regions in addressing one of the most pressing challenges of the 21st century i.e., transforming economies into drivers of sustainability and social equity.

The PAGE Programme was launched in 2013, and is a direct response by the UN system to the 2012 Rio+20 Declaration, "The Future we Want". The key objective of PAGE is to provide assistance to interested countries through a comprehensive and coordinated package of technical assistance and capacity building services that are aligned with sustainability objectives.


